### **Theater Arts--Overview**

- Plastic arts
  - Musical-instrument making
  - Scenery painting
  - Costume design



- Performing arts
  - Public festivities
  - Theater arts
    - Prose comedy
    - Opera

## **Opera and Commedia**

- Opera
  - Sung
  - Professional musicians
  - Individual contracts
  - Texts published

- Commedia
  - Spoken
  - Professional actors
  - Group contract
  - Performances improvised

### **Between Opera and Commedia**

- Comic intermezzi
  - Between acts of serious opera
  - Between acts of serious dramas
  - Two singers
  - Specialized in comic roles

- Provisional opere buffe
  - Displaced serious opera
  - Three or four actors who sang
  - Sinfonie, ritornelli

### **Comic intermezzi for opera**

### • He/she

- Rich/poor
- Good/crude manners
- Astrology
  - Pollastrella e Parpignacco [Gasparini 1708; from prose comedy 1606]
    - Pollastrella has 30 admirers
    - Seeks to ensnare an astrologer (Parpagnacco)
    - The moon is in its sixth quarter
    - Her fortune is told: she should perform in an intermedio

### Foreigness

- Satires on dress, speech, ambition, self-definition
- Venezianità (feasts, vacuous ceremonies)

### **Musical intermezzi for spoken dramas**

- Many examples by Imer and Goldoni
  - La cantatrice (independent, Feltre 1729; as La Pelarina, Venice 1734)
  - La pupilla/ Belisario premier (1734)
  - La birba/ Rosmonda, Belisario revival (1735)
  - Il filosofo/ Griselda (aut. 1735)
  - L'ippocondriaco/Griselda (aut. 1735)
  - La bottega da caffè a 3 (independent, 1736)
  - Monsieur Petiton a 4 (independent, 1737)

### **Satires in Theatrical Guise**


- Satires on serious opera

- Satires on the New World
- Satires on Venetian feasts

#### Galileo's telescope • 1610






### The ecliptic: apparent path of Sun










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## **Tides and Hydrology**

- Science often condemned
- (Astrologers often mocked on stage)





### **Venetian responses**

### Goldoni—Curriculum vitae

- Itinerant early life
- Feltre (1729-32)





### **Goldoni--Venice**

Many comic intermezzi and comedies

- 1732-34 Venice/Verona (Giuseppe Imer)
- 1734-37
- 1738 Genoa, with Imer
- 1739-41 Serious opera at San Gio Grisostomo
- 1741-43 Genovese consul in Venice
- 1743-45 Parma
- 1748-52 Mul
- 1752-62
- 1761 on Paris
- Multiple Venetian theaters
- San Salvatore, Venice



# Galuppi—Curriculum Vitae

- 1720s—harpischordist, composer in
  - Chioggia
  - Vicenza
  - Venice
- 1730s—composed operas (mainly serious)
  - Venice
  - Turin
- 1740s—career flourished
  - London
  - Milan, Rome
  - Vienna

1748—elected vice maestro at San Marco

- 1750 Il conte Caramello
- 1752 Le virtuose ridicule

## Settings—Acts 1, 2

### Act One

- Night, with moon and stars.
- Roof garden over the house of Ecclittico, with an observatory and a great telescope in the middle. Four lanterns.
- Ecclittico and his students

• Act Two, Scene 1

- Beautiful garden designed to look like the moon, where different images are shown to delude Buonafede.
- Buonafede sleeps near a bed of flowers. Ecclittico appears in an extravagant costume. Ernesto is in his robes.

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### Settings—Act 2

- Act Two, Scene 5
  - A chariot is pulled by four men in weird attire, with Cecco, dressed as an emperor, atop of chariot.
  - Ernesto, dressed as a hero, arrives on foot. He has a star on his forehead.
  - Buonafede looks on in wonder.

- Act Two, Scene 11
  - Flaminia and Clarice descend on a machine during a balletto.
  - Buonafede helps them get down.
  - Cecco and Lisetta, sitting on thrones, are joined by Ernesto and Ecclitico.

- Act Three, Scene 1
